Black Burnished wares

Black burnished ware is a native type of Romano-British pottery which was manufactures in two distinct areas. BB1 was made in Dorset from the 2nd to the 4th century AD and has inclusions of black and red iron ores, flint, quartz, shale fragments, and white mica. This ware may have had its origins in the local pre-Roman Durotrigian pottery industry. BB2 was made around the Thames estuary and has a finer fabric.

Before the pot was fired it was polished with a stone to give a burnished appearance and help it to retain water. Typically it has a diamond pattern lightly etched into the surface.

Black burnished ware has a wide distribution. In Herefordshire sherds have been found at Lugwardine, at excavations outside Kenchester (Magnis),¹ Ariconium,² Blackwardine,³ at the Romano-British settlement site at Stretton Grandison,⁴. and at Whitchurch.⁵
