

Herefordshire ceramics type fabric series (Romano-British pottery found in Herefordshire)

New Forest slipwares

Fine, dark- or red-slipped tableware - late 3rd to late 4th centuries. It was produced in the area of what is now the New Forest and is widely distributed in southern England, occurring with decreasing frequency beyond.¹

Recovered from excavations outside Kenchester (Magnis) in 1977 – 1979.²
