HEREFORD EXCAVATIONS

The first series of excavations on the site of Holloway and Webb's yard in Victoria Street had to be brought to a rapid conclusion when the buildings on the site were demolished. A new headquarters building has been found in Edgar Street and further excavations are planned. Pottery which was found in Trench Two, behind the wall and apparently in the tail of the Rampart, is proving to be very interesting. Similarities are difficult to find, and various experts have given the pottery widely differing dates.

As a result it is proposed to open a further area to the East of the wall line, and including more of the tail of the rampart in the hopes that further examples of this pottery can be found and that datable evidence may help to give a more accurate archaeological dating to the rampart.

It is hoped that some of this can be achieved by using paid labour, but a weekend series of excavations will be also necessary. Before the roadworks take place in the spring, the site of Bastion 3 should be examined, if only to see if any parts of it can be preserved in the proposed grass verge to the new road. Demolition will shortly occur on the corner of Bath Street and St Owen's Square where Hardings foundry now stands. This will need, at the least, a watching brief.

To solve these various problems, a series of weekends have been arranged and all volunteers will be welcome. The dates are as follows:-

U 87 Hereford City Rampart

I am assured by Mr Saunders, Inspector of Ancient Monuments for England, that the scheduling is in progress of those stretches of the rampart which are worthy of preservation. We assume that these areas are those indicated by Air Cdre Moore in April this year.

U 65 St Weonard's Tump

Unfortunately, the road mentioned in our last News Letter was built rapidly, and all traces of the ditch which may have existed on the northwest side have been totally destroyed. A small portion of the mound has been cut away. Full details have been passed through Stan Stanford with a request that the Ministry would treat it as an urgent case.



PROMONTORY FORT - DORSTONE HILL

GR 327 422, Scale 1" = 50' (approx)



The summit of Dorstone Hill projects as a steep-sided spur into the head of the Golden Valley. The reasonably level plateau-like summit shews evidence of fairly intensive occupation in prehistoric times. A record exists of numerous finds of flint implements and pottery sherds, of dates down to Romano-British times, picked up on the surface.

In the field to the northwest of the site, tentative excavation made in 1965 brought to light a wealth of flint artifacts and pottery from Neolithic to Roman times. Further to the NW is the celebrated Arthur's Stone, and at the foot of the hill to the SE are the remains of a second long barrow.

The SE tip of the spur, forming the highest portion of Dorstone Hill, is divided from the remainder of the plateau by a rampart and fosse constructed in one almost straight

length, 180' long. The rampart has a width at its base of approximately 20' and rises to a maximum height of 7'6" above the present bottom of the fosse and 2' above the area within. The fosse averages 20' in width and has a present maximum depth of 4'6". There is no trace of any counterscarp bank. The area thus cut off by the defences is triangular in plan, 180' x 250', and is reasonably level, sloping gently down to its apex on the SE. On the south side of the enclosure the steep slope was deemed a sufficient defence but on the north there are traces of scarping with a faint berm below.

Beneath the lower apex of the encampment, the spine of the spur continues to fall steeply. The rampart on the south curves round to the east and quickly fades. Its fosse merges into a natural gulley. On the north it comes to an abrupt termination 18' from the edge of the scarp, but whether this can be the original entrance is doubtful as at this point there is no interruption in the external fosse. Less than one third of the distance along the rampart from its southern end there is a scarcely distinguishable gap and the fosse is here interrupted by a causeway 18' wide. The whole area is planted with conifers and greatly obscured by undergrowth.

The earthwork is not shewn on any of the Ordnance Survey maps, and is not mentioned in Vol I, Herefordshire, of the Royal Commission on Ancient Monuments. It would therefore seem to be previously unrecorded.
